Following our bench dedication, we held a Wreath Ceremony honoring the Camden 12 Patriots interred in the Quaker Cemetery in April.









My project for the coming year is to recognize a man, who if he had survived the war, may well have been remembered with the likes of Thomas Sumter, Andrew Pickens or even Francis Marion.

McClure as a "noted Partizan."

My project, "Forgotten Patriot No More," aims to highlight his service, specifically his last actions at the Battle of Hanging Rock as we 1) raise funds to place an information sign regarding Col. McClure, specifically at the Hanging Rock Battlefield at close to the point where he led the charge upon the enemy

2) Place a memorial marker at or close to the grave of his mother, Mary McClure at Burnt Meeting House Cemetery.

## Charles Burke Baxley March 25, 1952 - March 30, 2024

Charles Burke Baxley, 72, of Lugoff, South Carolina, died March 30.

Doug Doster, a Past President of the SCSSAR, said: "It is with sadness but also graciousness that I inform you of my brother-in-law, Charles Baxley's death this past Saturday morning. He had been suffering terribly with a cancer for some time. South Carolina has lost a great historian and promoter of our rich Revolutionary War History." Doug's wife Lynn is a sister of Charles.

As Charles was retiring from the practice of law in 2021, he was appointed by Governor Henry McMaster to serve as Chairman of the South Carolina Sestercentennial Commission. Charles' vision was focused on

making the state's large part in the Revolutionary War accessible to all.

Charles was a 1974 graduate of the University of South Carolina with a bachelor's degree in political science and a 1976 doctorate in law. He founded and practiced law with the firm of Baxley, Pratt & Wells, P.A., now Baxley, Wells, and Benson, P.A., for 45 years.

Charles was the editor and publisher of the on-line magazine, Southern Campaigns of the American Revolution, and gave battlefield tours and military staff rides. He organized academic conferences on Revolutionary War topics, an archaeological exploration of the Hobkirk Hill battlefield, a field trip group known as the "Corps of Discovery" to take people to little known Revolutionary War sites in the South, and a Revolutionary War Round-

table for amateurs and professionals to discuss the War in the South. His article on Gen. Nathanael Greene in South Carolina's Lowcountry was featured in the winter 2017 edition of Army History magazine.

He worked with the South Carolina Battleground Preservation Trust to map 20 Revolutionary War battlefields in the Carolinas, to plan new battlefield parks at Camden, Blackstock's Plantation and Moncks Corner, and the SC Liberty Trail.

His interest in the Southern Campaign grew beyond his magazine. He edited books on the subject, established the Mapping Congress to identify and protect historic resources, participated in several ETV documentaries on the Revolutionary War in the South, and assisted ETV

with the preparation of materials for middle schoolers to use as they were learning about the state's history. He founded the SC American Revolutionary War Trust to preserve research, documents and literature for future generations of citizens and scholars.

SC250 is committed to honoring Chairman Baxley's vision by continuing the work he started in 2019, guiding the Commission through its formative years. "It was his extraordinary drive to commemorate South Carolina's American Revolution history that brought us to this point," said Molly Fortune, SC250 Executive Director. "Moving forward, we will incorporate his passion and celebrate his decades of work in our ongoing mission to promote South Carolina's role in the American Revolution by educating, engaging and inspiring South Carolinians and visitors."





#### How to submit items to The Palmetto Patriot

The Palmetto Patriot welcomes articles and photos from compatriots in the South Carolina Society.

Here are some pointers.

Keep articles as short as possible while still telling the story. Send articles in Microsoft Word format to Tom.Hanson@HansonCommunications.org

Send digital photographs as attachments and not embedded into the Word document.

Make sure you images are high resolution, at least 200 DPI, and that no time or date stamps appear in the images.

Limit the number of photographs to those you would like most to appear in the publication.

In group shots, have participants drop their hands to their sides to avoid fig leaf poses.

When taking photos at meetings, get as close to the speaker as possible, and avoid shooting the backs of audience heads.

From Eric Barnhill, Gen. Andrew Pickens Chapter: Fill the frame with the subject, unless you are trying to capture a large area (monument, battlefield). Better to get head shots than feet shots. Choose your background carefully. Often it just takes a minute to look around and find a more appropriate background. Watch your lighting. Better to have subjects face the lights (sun for outdoor shots) and be careful of indoor lights, your camera may set the exposure for lights if they are in the shots. Articles are always more interesting when pictures accompany them. Take lots of digital pictures and choose the ones that best capture the subject. Check your spelling, spell check sometimes makes words you don't want.



### SAR Member: President Franklin Delano Roosevelt Leads the Nation in Prayer on D-Day



My fellow Americans: Last night, when I spoke with you about the fall of Rome, I knew at that moment that troops of the United States and our allies were crossing the Channel in another and greater operation. It has come to pass with success thus far.

And so, in this poignant hour, I ask you to join with me in prayer:

Almighty God: Our sons, pride of our Nation, this day have set upon a mighty endeavor, a struggle to preserve our Republic, our religion, and our civilization, and to set free a suffering humanity.

Lead them straight and true; give strength to their arms, stoutness to their hearts, steadfastness in their faith.

They will need Thy blessings. Their road will be long and hard. For the enemy is strong. He may hurl back our forces. Success may not come with rushing speed, but we shall return again and again; and we know that by Thy grace, and by the righteousness of our cause, our sons will triumph.

They will be sore tried, by night and by day, without rest — until the victory is won. The darkness will be rent by noise and flame. Men's souls will be shaken with the violences of war.

For these men are lately drawn from the ways of peace. They fight not for the lust of conquest. They fight to end conquest. They fight to liberate. They fight to let justice

arise, and tolerance and good will among all Thy people. They yearn but for the end of battle, for their return to the haven of home.

Some will never return. Embrace these, Father, and receive them, Thy heroic servants, into Thy kingdom.

And for us at home — fathers, mothers, children, wives, sisters, and brothers of brave men overseas — whose thoughts and prayers are ever with them — help us, Almighty God, to rededicate ourselves in renewed faith in Thee in this hour of great sacrifice.

Many people have urged that I call the Nation into a single day of special prayer. But because the road is long and the desire is great, I ask that our people devote themselves in a continuance of prayer. As we rise to each new day, and again when each day is spent, let words of prayer be on our lips, invoking Thy help to our efforts.

Give us strength, too — strength in our daily tasks, to redouble the contributions we make in the physical and the material support of our armed forces.

And let our hearts be stout, to wait out the long travail, to bear sorrows that may come, to impart our courage unto our sons wheresoever they may be.

And, O Lord, give us Faith. Give us Faith in Thee; Faith in our sons; Faith in each other; Faith in our united crusade. Let not the keenness of our spirit ever be dulled. Let not the impacts of temporary events, of temporal matters of but fleeting moment, let not these deter us in our unconquerable purpose.



dent, delivered remarks highlighting both the flexibility and innovation of the Patriot officers and soldiers, which would result in the Maham tower, ultimately defeating the British Garrison.

With an unsuccessful attack by Gen. Thomas Sumter in February, 1781, Lord Rawdon and the fort's namesake Lt. Col. John Watson Tadwell-Watson failed to foresee the vulnerability of their bases outside of Camden and Charlestown. Watson would then diminish the fort's defenses in an ill-conceived plan to pursue Francis Marion, leaving it vulnerable to siege by this very commander at the modern day Santee National Wildlife Refuge.

Following the wreath laying ceremony and moment of silence, led by John Raffield, Col. Matthew Singleton Chapter Vice President, the SCSSAR firing team delivered several volleys under the command of Color Guard Commander Scott Bruton.

The event saw excellent support from our uniformed Compatriots, resulting in both a five-man color guard and firing team. The SCSSAR is working to augment the number of uniformed members across all regions in order to not only showcase authentic historic reproduction clothing and accoutrements, but also support our national, state and chapter sponsored events in a very public manner. The SCSSAR offers financial assistance of \$50 toward the procurement of a militia uniform/colonial clothing and \$100 toward a regimental uniform.

The National Society, the South Carolina Society, and the Gen. Francis Marion Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution commemorated the 244th anniversary of the Battle of Waxhaws, better known as Buford's Massacre, May 25, at the Battle Site near Buford's Crossroads about nine miles east of Lancaster, South Carolina.

The event began at 10:30 a.m. with guest speakers and a formal wreath-laying ceremony. Many guests wore period dress, including Continental and Militia attire. The story of Buford's Massacre was told as the bravery of the Patriots were commemorated, and the fallen were honored.

Col. Abraham Buford was the commander of a Virginia Regiment of infantry and a company of artillery comprised of about 300 men.

Two hundred forty-four years ago, on May 29, 1780, British Lt. Col. Banastre Tarleton pursued Col. Buford from Nelson's Ferry to Buford near the Waxhaws District. Col. Buford attempted to surrender, but a bloody battle ensued, with American casualties numbering 113 against a handful of British fatalities. Even more were taken prisoner, and 150 of the 187 prisoners were wounded.

Tarleton became known as "Bloody Ban," and "Tarleton's Quarter!" became a rallying battle cry for Southern Patriots.


